

LAMAR UNIVERSITY DISTANCE EDUCATION

Distance Education offers courses through Interactive Video, Instructional Television (Telecourses), Online and selected off-campus locations. Registration for Distance Education courses is the same as for on-campus courses, unless otherwise noted.

DISTANCE LEARNING FEE INFORMATION: For students enrolled in Distance Education classes ONLY, the following university fees will be waived: Health Center Fee-\$30, Property Deposit Fee-\$10, Recreation Center Fee-\$50 and the Setzer Center Fee-\$30.

All Distance Learning methods are assessed a \$25 per credit hour Distance Learning Fee.

All Distance Learning Fees are NON-REFUNDABLE after 12th class day for Fall and Spring semesters, 4th class day for summer sessions and 1st class day for mini sessions.

TELECOURSES

Students earn college credit in the convenience of their home by watching televised lectures and submitting class assignments by fax, e-mail, or the postal system. Students can access these broadcasts on Time-Warner Cable (Channel 7) or check out the entire course on video tapes or DVD from the Gray Library Media Services with a valid student I.D. Students are encouraged to attend an orientation session for each Telecourse. The student will meet the instructor and be given a syllabus and other valuable information. Orientation sessions for all Telecourses will be held on **Tuesday, January 8, 2008** at 6:00 p.m. and repeated at 6:30 p.m. for those taking multiple courses. Telecourses and their Orientation room assignments are listed below.
